


This serial competition program has been imported by the Columbia Track Club from England. The designer, Ronald Hindley, currently has four other serial competitions going in addition to the CTC series. They are the Lincolnshire Series, the Lancashire Series, the A1 Series along the A1 motorway corridor, and the 100 Km Association Ultra Distance Cup. The idea is becoming very popular in England and people have shown great excitement here as well. At the age of 65, Ron ran 100 Km in less than 12 hours. Now, at age 85, he does a "brisk two miles before breakfast" and is thinking of racing a half-marathon in March.

We will be contacting our winners soon and distributing their prizes. Meanwhile, the 2007 Missouri Series is already underway and the results will continue to be posted on the CTC web site with occasional updates in the newsletter. We have greatly expanded the competition this year. If you look at your orange 2007 CTC race schedule that you received in the mail, every race will count except for the Two-Person Relay and the Summer Youth Program. The Great Sandbagger and the Cheese and Sauerkraut will be judged by overall finish. The One Hour Run will be a proportion of the winner's distance instead of speed. The "Other Columbia Races" listed at the bottom of the sheet will not be included as we decided that it should be only Columbia Track Club events. Good running to all in the new year. Kevin Tyler

Participation as well as performance is rewarded, as the nore races you run, the better your score.

Looking back: In 2006 CTC sponsored monthly running events, spring track workouts, and a four week summer youth program. The club continued to supported our youth athletes through the Colts Track & Field

Team and Colts Cross Country Team. We gave 2 scholarships for college, helped fund raise for the Central Missouri Food Bank (Cranberry Crawl 5K), and the Arthritis Foundation (Jingle Bell 5K), and helped with travel expenses for members to compete nationally. We developed a youth and elite partnership in the cross country program. Elite CTC runners helped coach the youth in what was our most outstanding cross country season ever. CTC sent youth and elite cross runners to the USATF Regionals, and a men's cross country team and two women to compete in the USATF Club Nationals. We began the Missouri Series, or Serial Competition, offering incentives for runners/walkers of all ages, abilities and interests. This series gave us an international connection, too.

Looking ahead: In 2007 we plan to continue all of the above, plus expand the serial competition; and seek development grants for our youth and elite cross country teams. This year we are offering a youth discount for some races to encourage families to participate (indicated on our 2007 race schedule.)

Thanks to the diligence of our webmasters, we'll continue to present and preserve race results, with links to other events and information of interest.



SHOW ME STATE GAMES: 2000-2006 (every since I was 6 yrs. old) I have won at least one medal every year.



Meet Ron Hindley, designer of the Serial Competition Program Dear All in Missouri,

For me this is a great day to be thankful, as it means that an idea conceived in 1991 has finally come to fruit. I thought then that it had the quality of timelessness, having existed absolutely before it ever came into my mind, and hence that its ultimate success was inexorable whatever I did, even if I should quit the scene prematurely. Some people hardly read it, some avoided it politely, and one very powerful club rejected it with unconcealed contempt, observing that my literature lacked the convincing power of the bulleted paragraph, also declaring that it did not itself have sufficient resources for its promotion. I carried on by myself, and then all at once the Columbia Track Club announced its faith in it, and (incredible to me at first) the Road Running Secretary of the Lancashire Athletic Association proposed that he would use the privilege of admission to the Lancashire Series as a means of insisting on high standards of organization. What next?



Thank you for being the first club formally to award prizes to the holders of the leading places in a serial competition of this kind—an historic distinction. Thank you again for all your hard work.

As I used to say to my loving dog who accompanied me on my training runs, keep going. Happy days ahead, Ron Hindley


Editor's Note: Kevin Tyler introduced us to Mr. Hindley last year in the January 2006 CTC newsletter: "I attended college at Harlaxton in Grantham, Lincolnshire, England from Jan.-May of 1976 as part of a study abroad program. During that time I became friends with a runner named Ron Hindley. Ron, a WWII veteran, began running at the age of 50 and by 1976, at the age of 54, had run a 3:05 marathon. He became very involved in ultramarathoning and founded the 100 km race in England. I returned to England for the first time in 29 years this past June (2005) and renewed my friendship with Ron."

History repeats itself...

Thirty two years ago a CTC race was canceled due to snow. Four out of town runners came, despite the weather, ready to run. After learning the race was cancelled, the disappointed four ran their own race in the balcony of the Columbia College Gym. These four were very "dismayed" at thinking CTC would cancel a race. "Ever since then", Joe Duncan writes below, "we have had a policy of never canceling or postponing a race." So, in the spirit of 'the race must go on', we persisted in our attempt to hold the Jingle Bell 5K as planned, despite the snow. But, the only race volunteers able to get there were Steve Stonecipher-Fisher, and Michele McFadden who walked. The race course was snow and ice covered, with high potential for sliding vehicles. Steve decided to cancel the race before start time. As was the case 32 years ago, runners came to run. About 20 or so, I'm told, including a couple from Jefferson City. And, as in the past, some runners ran their own race, including CTC's Hugh and Andy Emerson, Kurt Kennett, and Phil Shaefer, though, as Hugh told me, they ran without bells to jingle. There are runners who refuse to be stopped by Mother Nature.

Here's Joe Duncan's recollection of what happened on March 23, 1974, the only other time CTC canceled an event:

"On March 23, 1974, a 6-mile Run-Walk Relay was scheduled for 2:00 PM at Hickman track. Overnight, Friday, and Saturday morning, Columbia got a crippling six inches of snow. It was apparent we could not run on the snow-covered Hickman track, therefore, we made many phone calls and decided to postpone the race until the next day."

"Shortly after 2:00 I got a phone call from Dennis Stewart. It seems he, having come from Higginsville, Dean Neal and Rex Frazer, both coming from Ft. Leonard Wood, and Tom Kilburn were at the track, ready to run, although they realized that wouldn't be possible. I told Denny there would be no race that day. Undaunted, the four went to the old Columbia College Gym and ran three miles on the balcony of that gym. 75 laps. Stewart won in 17:15, Neal and Kilburn were at 18:10 and Frazer was 19:08 and we gave them the appropriate ET points. The next day we had a 3 -mile (probably short) run at Cosmos Park with nine runners and two walkers. Kilburn won with a 15:52, Whitney Hicks had 18:48 and Joe Duncan 20:07. Stewart, Neal and Frazer had gone home, dismayed at thinking we would cancel or postpone a CTC race. Ever since then we have had a policy of never canceling or postponing a race, someone is certain to show up, although we have occasionally had to move a race to the Hearnes Fieldhouse or to Rock Bridge because of a flooded Hickman track."

CTC CROSS COUNTRY ELITE AND YOUTH COMPETE IN THE SUN AND SNOW AT THE USATF NATIONAL'S

December 9, 2006, USATF National's, San Francisco, CA

The pinnacle of the CTC elite team's season ended in overwhelming success at Golden Gate Park, located in the middle of San Francisco. With 328 men towing the line for the rolling, muddy loop filled 10K, CTC's Matthew Noonan bolted to the lead, briefly, saying "I felt good at the corner and just thought I might as well take the lead". He would finish as the second CTC member behind Matthew Laye, who was clearly the hometown favorite, with family, college and high school teammates lining the course. For a second straight year Andrew Norton, Mr. Consistency, was CTC's third man. New to the team, Tim Langen, had his best race of the year and finished as CTC's fourth man saying, "That was one of my best races in years". Ted Zderic, also competing for a second straight year with the CTC elite, rounded out the scoring members. Matt Dreier, probably still sore from his runner-up finish at Heart of America Marathon was CTC's sixth finisher. The mens team finished 25th of 42, improving by 3 places over last year's team even though 4 more teams were entered. For the CTC elite women Alison Hogdson and Beth Luebbering did battle in the women's open 6K against a highly competitive field on a deceptively tough course, although Alison didn't seem to mind the slip and slide: "I love running in the mud so I had a lot of fun on the course. Beth and I were really grateful that we were able to compete despite not having a full team."

In addition to time spent racing the team enjoyed two nights of hospitality at the Laye's house, runs in the Oakland hills and across the Golden Gate Bridge, and bread bowl clam chowder at Fisherman's Warf, making this trip to many, "the best cross country trip ever." Matt Laye

Some thoughts on their experience: "That many people (235) really made it hard and showed that you really need to get out in front fast.", observed Jordan amd Zachary Cook. "We had a really fun time and hope we get to do it again next year." Danica Shimkus said the trip to Spokane was something she will never forget, and thanked her mom and dad for taking her there. Margaret Shimkus, Danica's mom and CTC Youth Team Coach said "Danica liked running with snow all around, except when all the girls fell, but again that is something she will never forget!" "She wished she would have had a better race, but was happy to have the experience of running against all those girls. She thought the people were very nice and helpful." "As a coach of youth age runners, it amazes me that some kids treat training and racing with such intensity. I can't help but wonder what their future holds for them. Will their intensity run out? 

January Cold Ineffective as Deterrent for Columbia Runners Dreier, Thomas take 10K, Reeves takes 20K at 2007 Runner's Choice By Eric Bunch

Saturday, January 6, a typically chilly winter morning, found me setting up a white table with abnormally short legs in the middle of a parking lot at Bethel Park. At 7:00 am very few signs of life exist in such a blustery environment. Had I arrived too early? However, I lay out a pen and open spiral notebook knowing that they would arrive soon. An hour earlier I had crept my way through the dark at Tryathletics to fill water coolers and retrieve miscellaneous items which included locating that small table and hefting a husky race clock into the front seat of my compact car. A short while later I was unloading one of those full coolers at a nondescript location on the shoulder of Nifong. I set it against the guardrail and sped away as if to leave it for a covert pickup. This would mark the turnaround for the 2007 Runner's Choice.

Sure enough, at about 7:30 they did begin to arrive. One or two at a time, the runners, unfettered by the cold of the Missouri winter, came to prove their dedication. Some drove, a few walked or ran and at least one biked to the start; twenty-seven of them in all had come to make their bid at the 10K or 20K. Luckily, one of them, Matt Dreier, had enough sense to realize that my short legged table actually could be extended to a height reasonable for its intended purpose. A bit cold for wayward bystanders and the occasional underdressed race director, the weather was perfect for the committed harriers hoping to motor their ways to personal bests, coveted bragging rights or unbridled competition.

Shortly after 8:00 they were off. I watched as they disappeared around the corner at Nifong Road to the north. Their path would take them all the way to that blank spot on the side of the road where I had earlier dropped off five gallons of water, now occupied by Linda LaFontaine and Joe Duncan. Then they would return some thirty minutes later in the same route. The ones doing the 10K would finish and those electing to do the longer alternative would make the turn to repeat the out and back.

With the clock ticking, I made predictions in my head as I waited. Matt Dreier's lack of commitment to one of the two distances distracted my prediction process. He would surely be a factor in whichever race he decides to do. Sure enough, just after thirty-seven minutes Dreier rounded the corner with Marc Keys in tow. They crossed the line in 37:39 and 37:45 respectively. Next, in just under 40 minutes, was Trevor Reeves completing his first lap on the way to the 20K. Mike Denehy with his quadruped training partner, Riley crossed the 10K line in third place. Competitive triathlete and CTC cross country runner, Tony Rigdon, came in fourth. Destiny Thomas was the first woman to cross the line with Lisa Wells coming in second.

Trevor Reeves continued his torrid pace to take the 20K title in 1:19:04. A relative newcomer to the CTC scene, Reeves only began running a couple of years prior to his impressive 20K debut. His time from this year's Runner's Choice 20K was faster pace than his 10K from the previous year's event. Tom May and Phil Schaefer battled out a close race for second with May coming out on top. Andy Emerson crossed the 20K mark in 1:27:45 and continued for a third lap becoming the first person to complete the Runner's Choice 30K option.


